Week 1 The Lord your God

Video summary

You find the 10 commandments in Exodus 20:1-21.

God speaks. He speaks commands and laws. The first commandment is to put God first.

We need to look at what God says first. He says

"I am the Lord your God who brought you out of Egypt. Out of the land of slavery"

In the passage *The Lord your God* is a phrase used 4 times. *The Lord* is used a further 3 times.

The context before the commands are given (Exodus 19) is of *The Lord* descending in incredible glory on Mount Sinai. After the commandments the people are in fear and awe of such an awesome being who has come so close.

There is one mighty, awesome, creator God who rules. He is The Lord. There is none other like him. He is first and must be first because he is everything. He is to be worshipped and adored and respected. Everything begins with him (in the beginning God.... Gen.1:1).

He is the alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end. The one who was and is and is to come, the Almighty (Rev1:8).

In the week ahead there are 3 personal study sessions looking at the greatness, the goodness and the glory of God.

Set aside some time to be alone with God 15-30 minutes.

Begin each personal study session with the prayer below.

Don't worry about getting all the right answers just be open to what God will say to you.

Personal study 1 The greatness of the Lord

Job 38 - 42

Job in the midst of his suffering, with all his unanswered questions, has been calling on God for answers.

God speaks to Job 38:1. He is a big voice speaking out of a storm.

But instead of answers for Job, God asks Job some questions.

Count the number of questions God asks in chapter 38+39.

Take time to answer the questions that God asks (out loud may be helpful). How many can you answer?

God was showing Job how small and weak and helpless he truly was. Who was Job to question God? Look at **40:1-5.** Why do you think God make Job feel so small?

In 42:5 Job says – my ears had heard of you but now my eyes have seen you. Job has had a personal encounter with the Lord. He understands how great God is in a whole new way.

Look at **42:1-6**

How does Job answer the question who is The Lord?

Do you ever forget how GREAT God is?

How important is it to remember God's greatness at this time?

We have a relationship with a God who is invisible. Seeing God is difficult because he is so glorious and different and beyond us.

Read Isaiah 6:1-8 What does Isaiah see? What impact does seeing God have on Isaiah (v.5)?

Read Exodus 24:3-18

What does Moses and the others see?

How had they prepared to see God (v.3-8)?

Read Revelation 1:9-20

What does John see?

What impact does it have on him?

Do you desire to see God?

What preparations can you make to be ready for encountering God?

Week 2 Jesus is Lord

Video summary John 20:24-31

When the other disciples said we have seen the Lord Thomas wasn't convinced.

He said unless I see and touch I won't believe.

A week later – Thomas puts his fingers into the nail marks on Jesus' hands.

He had journeyed with Jesus – seen the miracles and heard the words and miracles.

The powerful proofs and signs pointing to his true reality.

Now he is resurrected – it is sealed – the final nail in the coffin for Thomas' belief is the reality of a nail pierced hand holding his own.

Jesus is alive – Jesus is Lord.

As Peter preaches on the Day of Pentecost he gives a clear proclamation of who Jesus is. Acts 2:36 let all of Israel be assured of this: God has made this Jesus whom you crucified but Lord and Christ

Personal study 1 His glorious greatness John 1

When the gospels tell us of the birth of Jesus they do it in different ways. Matthew and Luke tell us many of the human story details. Mark doesn't mention it at all but simply moves to the ministry of Jesus. John puts the birth of Jesus in a broader perspective of all eternity.

Using the different accounts answer these questions.

When was Jesus born?

Luke 2:1-7

John 1:1

Who made Jesus?

Matthew 1:18-25

John 1:1-3

Where did Jesus live?

Matthew 2:19-23

John 1:1-2

What did people see when they looked at Jesus?

John 1:10

John 1:14

Who is this man? That is one of the questions that people were asking in the gospels as they watch what Jesus does and says and claims.

Activity

Personal study 2 His powerful presence

The stories of Jesus are incredible. They are full of impossibilities and wonders. In John's gospel he shares 7 signs. These are 7 stories that offer proof of who Jesus is. They are demonstrations of what Jesus can do and act as proof of who Jesus is.

Take time to read these 7 signs

- 1 Changing water into wine at the wedding at Cana (John 2:1-11);
- 2 Healing the royal official's son (John 4:46-54);
- 3Healing the paralyzed man at the pool of Bethesda in Jerusalem (John 5:1-15);
- 4 Feeding the 5,000 (John 6:5-14);
- 5 Walking on water (John 6:16-21);
- 6 Healing the man born blind (John 9:1-12)
- 7 Raising Lazarus from the dead (John 11:1-45).

Pastor and theologian Timothy Keller says:

[Miracles] lead not simply to cognitive belief, but to *worship*, to awe and wonder. Jesus' miracles in particular were never magic tricks, designed only to impress and coerce. . . . Instead, he used miraculous power to heal the sick, feed the hungry, and raise the dead. Why? We modern people think of miracles as the suspension of the natural order, but Jesus meant them to be the restoration of the natural order. The Bible tells us that God did not originally make the world to have disease, hunger, and death in it. Jesus has come to redeem where it is wrong and heal the world where it is broken. His miracles are not just proofs that he has power but also wonderful foretastes of what he is going to do with that power. Jesus' miracles are not just a challenge to our minds, but a promise to our hearts that the world we all want is coming

Activity

From believing to worshipping

Prayerfully add some words to your <u>Putting it into Words</u> sheet on page 4 specifically focusing on who Jesus is.

Personal study 3 His greater glory

Jesus was an ordinary human man living a human life in the midst of a real family and community. He was also extraordinary. He performed signs and miracles. He showed incredible wisdom and teaching. On one specific occasion some of his disciples had a glimpse of even greater glory.

Read Matthew 17:1-13 the transfiguration

Every day these disciples see Jesus as a normal human being but here on top of the mountain for a moment they see something more. They have a glimpse of the greater glory – the reality that is normally veiled in flesh.

What extraordinary things did Peter, James and John see?

Read what Peter writes about this experience in **2 Peter 1:16-18.** We have not made up stories but we were eye witnesses of his majesty.

What has God the Father given Jesus v.17?

John who saw Jesus transfigured also saw a vision of Jesus in heaven.

Read Revelation 5

What does John see revealed about Jesus?

Activity

Take some time to reflect on these different images of Jesus that we carry in our minds

- 1 A baby in a manger
- 2 A good teacher helping people
- 3 A dead man hanging on a cross
- 4 The Lamb on the throne

What picture of Jesus do you carry with you the most? Are any of these pictures missing from your understanding of who Jesus is? How does each picture help your faith?

Video summary when Jesus becomes personal

Saul meets the living Jesus on the Damascus road (Acts 9). Paul is overwhelmed by the person he meets. Paul asked a question – *Who are you Lord?*(9:5).

Paul meets Jesus and realises that Jesus is the Son of God. This becomes an unshakable conviction that shapes Paul's life.

Because of Jesus, Paul is transformed. Because of Jesus, Paul changes the direction of his life.

A progression from believing in God, to accepting Jesus of Nazareth as God on earth to personal loyalty and commitment to Jesus in our lives.

I believe in the Lord God Almighty Jesus is The Lord Jesus is my Lord

When Jesus becomes personal it means I have a captured heart, a surrendered heart and an obedient heart.

Personal study 1 Enthralled by Jesus

Being a Christian should be first and foremost about something positive. We are to be a people who love Jesus.

Read Philippians 3:7-11

Paul is obsessed by Jesus. He is incredibly passionate about and committed to Jesus. He has a deep longing to know Jesus. Knowing Jesus is more important than anything else for Paul. He speaks about - the surpassing greatness of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord (v.8).

Honestly reflect on these questions

Do you find Jesus loveable?

What attracts you to Jesus?

How much do you love Jesus?

Maybe you find yourself closer to Teresa of Avila than to Paul when you look at the temperature of your love for Jesus

O God, I don't love you, I don't even want to love you but I want to want to love you

Teresa of Avila

I want to know Christ (v.10) Paul

Don't be discouraged or frustrated, simply ask God to increase your desire for Him.

One thing I ask of the Lord, this is what I seek, that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to gaze upon the beauty of the Lord and to seek him in his temple Psalm 27:4

Activity

To look into a loved one face, to appreciate a beautiful sunset, to admire a work of art.

These things take time and inspire love and appreciation.

Take time to gaze on the beauty of Jesus – to marvel and wonder at who He is.

Some ideas that may help:

- Use the Putting it into Words sheet page 4.
- Reflect again on some gospel stories and particularly Jesus' interactions with people.
- Read the crucifixion story to remind yourself how much Jesus loves you and how much he has done for you (Matthew 26:31-28:10).

Personal study 2 Surrendered to Jesus

The book of Romans is a great explanation of gospel theology. Paul writes the good news of what God is doing in Christ. A story that flows through all of eternity and effects all of history. When he sees all that God has done, is doing and will do he bursts into a great outpouring of praise.

Read Romans 11:33-36.

Then comes the personal implications of this great gospel good news. Paul wants us to think about how we respond to this gospel?

Read Romans 12:1-2

Picture yourself acting out v.1 – offering your body to God:

You walk up to the altar,

You climb on and lay your life down and offer yourself to God.

You surrender to God and say;

You are in charge.

You are in control.

I want to live life your way.

I want to be renewed and transformed.

I was in Bible college for 4 years in the mid 90's. We had college devotions a couple of times each week led by staff and students. There are only a few specific talks I can remember from all those I listened to and one was based on this passage. I vividly remember this line from that sermon

- the problem with a living sacrifice is that is can keep crawling off the altar.

A living sacrifice has to continually be examined to make sure it remains firmly placed on the altar.

Activity

Your finances.


How central is God? (Mark a dot in the circle).

Personal study 3 Obedient to Jesus

Jesus is Lord — a proclamation
I confess Jesus as Lord — a submitting
I obey Jesus as Lord — a lifestyle

Having Jesus as Lord is about a lifestyle of obedience.

I walk in His ways and build my life around His teaching.

I do what he says because He rules over my life and I belong to Him.

His Lordship of my life is seen in my daily choices and actions.

Read these verses and reflect on what God would say about how you are living your life in the last week -i.e. your lifestyle.

Matthew 7:21

His name can be on our lips but our lives focused on doing my will rather than His.

Matthew 7:22-23

I can be doing religious things and incredible things but not be focused on knowing Jesus and what He wants.

Matthew 7:24-27

I can know his words but not be putting them into practice.

James 1:22-25

I can listen for a while and then forget to do.

James 2:14-17

I can talk a lot about faith but be limited in doing anything practical.

Activity

This is a prayer activity. Take 2 kitchen chairs. Sit in one with the other opposite you. Imagine Jesus is in chair opposite you.

Using your insights from above, realign yourself to God in prayers of repentance and commitment.

e.g. Look Lord I have turned away from you (turn your back on the chair opposite) because I said this to Bob..... I have forgotten to keep a reign on my tongue. Forgive me Lord. I turn back to you (turn to face the chair in front again) and want to honour you in how I speak.

Personal study 1 Patient hope Romans 8:18-27

Paul contrasts what we experience now and the fullness of what is to come.

Present suffering – future glory that will be revealed.

Groaning with frustration now – glorious freedom to come.

Firstfruits of the Spirit now- the fullness of salvation to come.

Look at the type of language Paul uses about our Christian experience in this world

We live with eager expectation (v.19)

We groan inwardly (v.23)

We wait eagerly (v.23)

We hope for what we don't have (v.24)

We wait patiently (v.25)

Take a moment to examine your heart. Do you suffer from any of the following spiritual aliments?

An excess of groaning and complaining.

A lack of patience.

A loss of hope.

Activity
